School of Character

Character education is based on supporting each and every person to achieve their potential.

Our School of Character programme aims to develop confident and compassionate students who are effective contributors to society, successful learners and responsible citizens. Character education is about helping students grasp what is ethically important in situations and to act for the right reasons, so that they become more autonomous and reflective.

Skills within character education include resilience, determination, confidence and creativity.

Evidence demonstrates that schools that are values driven have high expectations and represent academic, professional and social success.

Fundamentally, character education is founded upon belonging to and living within a community.

The Sixth Form Curriculum at The Polesworth School Sixth Form @ Tomlinson Hall

Our students stay with us for two years following a Level 3 programme of study. We offer a wide range of subjects, mostly traditional A Levels, covering humanities, science, social science and creative and expressive arts. The majority of our students take 3 subjects but there is an opportunity for some of our highest attainers to take 4 subjects. A Levels and Level 3 vocational courses allow students to progress to higher level study at university or college or to move into employment.

Sixth Form Entry Requirements

Level 3 courses are challenging and demanding; it is therefore very important that students embarking on these courses have demonstrated both their commitment to study and achieved the appropriate grades at GCSE which will enable them to be successful in post-16 study. For 2021 our general entry requirements are a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grade 5+ or their equivalent which must include:

- a grade 5 or above in either English Language or English Literature with at least a Grade 4 in English Language
- a grade 4 in Mathematics
- a grade 5 or its equivalent in any subject which has been taken at GCSE or other Level 2 qualification that is to be carried on to A Level unless otherwise specified.

In addition there are specific subject requirements as listed below.

Art: General entry requirements; students must also have taken an Art based subject at GCSE and achieved at least a grade 5.

Biology: Students must have a grade 5 or above in Mathematics and a grade 6 or above in Biology and a grade 5 in a second science, or grades 5 and 6 in Double Science.

Business Studies: There is no need to have studied GCSE Business Studies to take this course at A level but as good numeracy skills are required, applicants must have, in addition to the general entry requirements, at least a grade 4 in Mathematics.

Chemistry: Students must have a grade 5 or above in Mathematics and grade 6 or above in Chemistry and a grade 5 in a second science, or grades 5 and 6 in Double Science.

Classical Civilisation: There is no need to have studied either History or Classical Civilisation at GCSE, although an interest in History is crucial, but we do expect students to have a grade 5 or above in English Literature as this is an essay and literature based subject. If this subject has been taken at GCSE then students should have achieved

at least a grade 5.

Core Mathematics: Students should have a grade 5 or higher in Mathematics.

Design Technology - Product Design: Students should have a grade 5 or above in a Design and Technology subject and Mathematics at grade 5.

Digital Media (ICT): Students must have either a Merit in OCR National iMedia or a Merit/Grade 5 in an equivalent qualification as well as Mathematics GCSE grade 5 or above. If ICT has not been taken as a formal qualification at school, then students will need to demonstrate their ability to take this subject on to advanced level study.

Drama and Theatre: Although Drama GCSE is not essential, students should have a grade 5 or above in both English Language and English Literature.

Economics: There is no need to have studied Economics at GCSE to take this course at A level but given the demanding mathematical nature of the subject, Mathematics at grade 5 or above is essential.

English Literature: In addition to English Language GCSE at grade 5 or above, students must also have studied English Literature as a separate qualification and achieved at least a grade 5.

Forensic and Criminal Investigation: Students must have a minimum of two grade 5s in Science and a grade 5 in Mathematics.

French: Students must have taken French at GCSE and achieved at least a grade 6.

Further Mathematics: This course is for talented mathematicians who have achieved either a grade 8 or a grade 9 in Mathematics at GCSE.

Geography: Students must have taken Geography at GCSE and achieved at least a grade 5; Mathematics at grade 5 or above is also required for this subject.

German: Students must have taken German at GCSE and achieved at least a grade 6.

Government & Politics: General entry requirements; there is no need to have taken this subject at GCSE.

Health & Social Care: There is no need to have taken this subject at GCSE but students should have achieved two standard Pass grades in Science.

History: It is preferable, but not a requirement, that students should have studied History at GCSE and achieved at least a grade 5. However, if History has not been taken in year 11 then a grade 5 or above in English Literature is required as this is an essay based subject.

Law: There is no need to have taken this subject at GCSE. However, if Law has not been taken at GCSE then students should achieve grade 5s in both an essay based subject such as English Literature or History and in a factual based subject such as Science.

Mathematics: Students must have achieved at least a grade 6 in GCSE Mathematics.

Media Studies: General entry requirements; there is no need to have taken this subject at GCSE.

Music: This is a very specialised course and in addition to the general entry requirements for Sixth Form, students must also have taken a GCSE or other equivalent Level 2 qualification in this subject, achieving a grade 5 or above, play a musical instrument or sing and take instrumental lessons arranged either internally through school or externally. Students may be invited to audition prior to the commencement of the course if singing only is offered. Please state on the application form in the personal statement section your musical experience to date.

PE: It is preferable that students have studied this subject at GCSE or other equivalent Level 2 qualification and achieved at least a grade 5 or a Pass. Mathematics at grade 5 and ideally 2 Science GCSEs at grade 5 or above are also required for this subject; students must play a competitive sport for a team (which should be made clear on the personal statement section of the application form).

Physics: Students must have a grade 6 or above in Mathematics and a grade 6 or above in Physics and a grade 5 in a second science, or grades 5 and 6 in Double Science.

Psychology: There is no need to have studied Psychology at GCSE. However, as this is a science based subject students should have at least a grade 5 in Mathematics and 2 sciences at grade 5 or above.

RS, Philosophy & Ethics: It is preferable that students have achieved at least a grade 5 at GCSE in RS. However, if this has not been taken as a qualification at GCSE, then a grade 5 or above in an essay based subject such as History or English Literature is required.

Sociology: There is no need to have taken this subject at GCSE. However, if Sociology has not been taken at GCSE then a grade 5 in an essay based subject such as History or English Literature is essential.

Travel & Tourism: Students should meet the general entry requirements and have at least a Pass in this subject if taken at Level 2; however, there is no need to have taken this subject in year 11.

*** Please be aware that it is unfortunately sometimes necessary to withdraw a subject if there is insufficient student take up. In such an event we will inform students and parents/carers of that decision as soon as possible.**

APPLYING TO THE SIXTH FORM

If you wish to join The Polesworth School Sixth Form @ Tomlinson Hall, then please read through all our course information and entry requirements very carefully. Attend our virtual Sixth Form Open Evening, which this year is being held on Thursday 21st January 2021 from 6.00pm, or contact the Head of Sixth Form or Key Stage 5 Student Support Manager to discuss your application. You should also discuss your course choices with your teachers, your parents/carers and careers staff at your school.

To apply, you should use our online application form. Please note that this form must be completed in one go so please allow sufficient time to complete it. Please also ensure that you have your UPN number to hand prior to starting your application (this can be obtained from your school).

Please give as much information in your personal statement as you can about yourself, your strengths, interests and career aspirations to help us assess your suitability for your chosen courses. Your predicted grades at GCSE are also very important.

This year we are not automatically interviewing all students. Following your application we will look at your course choices and make you a conditional offer based on your GCSE results; this offer will be confirmed in writing. Some students change their minds about their subject choices after they have applied and this is usually not a problem – just contact us to discuss your programme of study.

We will ask you to accept or decline your offer of a place in the Summer Term. If you decide to take up our offer of a place and achieve our entry requirements, then we formally register students for their courses on GCSE results day in August or on the first day of term in September.

If you do not meet our entry requirements, then we may be able to consider alternative courses.

YOUR PROGRAMME OF STUDY

The majority of our students take 3 subjects at Level 3 although some may be able to take 4. On the application form we ask you to select up to 6 subjects for study in order of preference. We do not have any set option blocks but devise them once applications are in based on the subjects students want to study.

APPLICATIONS DEADLINE

Students should apply by Friday 5th March 2021 although early applications are advisable to ensure your subject choices. We continue to accept applications after this deadline; however, there may be some restrictions on subject choices.

SIXTH FORM INDUCTION DAY

At present we are planning to hold an Induction Day for all prospective Sixth Form students on Tuesday 13th July 2021 and all applicants are expected to attend. On this day students attend 'taster' lessons and summer holiday assignments are set in order to prepare for the new term in September.



Student Services

At The Polesworth School Sixth Form we value all of our students and are passionate about providing excellent care and guidance throughout their time in the Sixth Form. Our goal is to ensure that all students experience a smooth transition from Key Stage 4 to Key Stage 5 and can access onsite support and advice from key members of the school's pastoral team.

PASTORAL STRUCTURE

Our pastoral structure takes a student-centric approach with the student being at the centre of what we do. Level 3 study is a challenging time and it is crucial that students feel they have access to support if necessary.

All students have a Personal Tutor and attend tutor time for 20 minutes every day. The role of the Personal Tutor is to support students in their journey through A Levels and deliver the School of Character programme which aims to develop confident and compassionate students who are effective contributors to society, successful learners and responsible citizens.

There is plenty of support for students from the dedicated Sixth Form team including the Director of Post-16, KS5 Student Support Manager, Sixth Form Academic Support Mentor and the Careers Education Coordinator. Members of the Sixth Form team support students on a one-to-one basis and are here to help with issues in or outside of school or worries affecting attendance, wellbeing or progress. The Inclusion Department can offer specialised support to students with specific learning needs, medical conditions or disabilities to overcome any barriers to learning.

CHILD PROTECTION

We recognise our moral and statutory responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of all students. Staff are required to report concerns regarding a student's welfare and this includes Sixth Form students. There are a number of key Designated Safeguarding Leads on site and the KS5 Student Support Manager holds this responsibility for Sixth Form students.

CAREERS INFORMATION ADVICE AND GUIDANCE FOR THE SIXTH FORM

Careers information, advice and guidance is delivered by Mr Davis, the School's Careers Education Co-ordinator, and students in Year 12 and 13 can book appointments any time of the year with him. There is targeted support in Year 13 when every student receives a one to one guidance interview to discuss their post 18 options. In Year 12 guidance interviews are available on a self-referral basis. Mr Davis supports students making university and career choices and offers help in completing applications and personal statements. He offers advice on employment and apprenticeship opportunities, international study and GAP year options as well as volunteering and work experience placements. Mr Davis also delivers subject themed degree information sessions for Year 12s, organises visits to HE Fairs and Apprenticeship and Employment Fairs and arranges for universities and employers to come into school to talk to students. He attends all parents evenings and Sixth Form parents/carers can book appointments with him.

Extra curricular activities

CLUBS & ACTIVITIES

While the academic curriculum is of great importance, hobbies and leisure activities are vital too.

SPORTS

House teams compete in athletics, badminton, cricket, hockey, netball, rounders, football, rugby, tennis and cross-country. Selection for teams is an honour and students receive every encouragement to attend trials at District and County level. We are fortunate to have an excellent Sports Hall on site that extends the range of sporting activities available in school.

MUSIC

We offer numerous groups covering a wide range of musical styles from choirs, orchestra and woodwind groups to our many rock bands. We arrange regular performances at school and other venues locally and further afield.

ENGLISH AND DRAMA

Students take part in theatre visits. Theatre companies, poets and novelists are regular visitors to our school. The school performs annual drama/music productions.

DANCE

Dance club meets several times a week and we often host sizeable local events to showcase students' work.

THE VOICE

Our student council, known as The Voice, actively focuses on improving aspects of student welfare. Following elections, successful candidates meet regularly and are influential in helping our school develop.

Their role includes:

- Working with school staff to improve the school environment.
- Researching and feeding back to full staff meetings on educational issues in order to help develop classroom practice.
- Participating in staff interviews.
- Identifying and highlighting student needs and finding ways to meet those needs.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD SCHEME

Many students enjoy the challenges set by the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. We run an active group and there are opportunities to work towards awards at lunchtime, after school and at weekends.

ARTS

Students often attend our Art, Photography and Film clubs. Work produced in these clubs is often exhibited.

TECHNOLOGY

Cooking and Textiles Clubs run in our dedicated technology rooms.



Facilities

The Polesworth School is pleasantly situated amongst trees and gardens in around ten acres of grounds. Our extensive playing fields offer panoramic views of the surrounding Warwickshire and Staffordshire countryside.

At the entrance to our large site stands the original 140-year-old Victorian school building which is now the dedicated home of our Sixth Form students. Tomlinson Hall, named after one of the first Headteachers, is a space full of history and character where students engage in lessons and private study.

The school is equipped with some excellent facilities including:

Sports hall: featuring squash courts and a fitness suite, also open to the local community.

Gym: furnished for both gymnastics and dance. This is used by the local community at/on weekends/evenings.

Playing fields: football, rugby, tennis courts (seasonal), grass athletics track and space for extensive training grids - also used extensively in the holidays for students' multi sports activities.

Drama studio: featuring excellent audio and visual equipment and space for drama, used by students in all years. The school organises regular theatre and musical productions.

ICT: a large multi media study resource centre for research and independent learning. Three fully equipped ICT suites include one in the Sixth Form building, all used extensively. Most classrooms also house the latest ICT teacher toolkits, PCs and laptops.

Art: a superb purpose-built block, where students produce and display work and projects in contemporary surroundings.

Sixth Form: students have their own designated areas of the school in Tomlinson Hall which include teaching rooms, a new study centre with IT access and common room facilities.

Making informed choices at A level with University in mind

Looking ahead long-term

Around 75% of our students apply for university. You may have already decided that your own career plans involve progression to Higher Education or you may as yet be unsure. However, you should be aware that your choices of A Level subjects may be critical in determining the university courses open to you.

Therefore, if you are thinking of going to university and have a particular area of study or career path in mind, as well as doing some research into individual A Level subjects, you should also be finding out about what the degree courses you may be interested in expect of potential applicants.

UCAS

This is the organisation which handles university admissions and the UCAS website is excellent! Go to: www.ucas.com and use the course search facility. Here you will find details of the subject(s) you are interested in studying and can find out about what different universities require or what different courses stipulate as their entry criteria.

Remember that universities operate their own courses and set their own individual entry policies; no two universities will be exactly the same. All universities have online prospectuses giving more detail about the degree programmes they offer and these are also excellent sources of information.

If you have any doubts at all, as well as asking your teachers, our Careers Co-ordinator, Chris Davis, or Sixth Form specialist staff, you can always contact a university directly for advice – admissions staff are usually more than happy to talk about the entry policy of their particular institution.

GETTING READY FOR UNIVERSITY

Most universities expect students to take a minimum of 3 subjects at full A Level. You should also realise that universities may ask for a certain number of GCSEs and that they often specify minimum grades at GCSE in certain subjects.

In addition most universities expect students to achieve both English (usually Language) and Mathematics GCSE at grade 5 or above. When applying to competitive universities for popular courses, the higher you have achieved at GCSE, the better your chances are of being accepted. Applicants to Oxford or Cambridge generally achieve all 8s and 9s at GCSE as do applicants for Medicine or Veterinary Science. Indeed, some medical courses require a minimum of 7 top grades at GCSE.

A LEVELS AND DEGREE PROGRAMMES

For many universities and courses, the subjects you take at A Level are not crucial: it is the fact that you have taken A Level qualifications that counts. It is also possible to take many subjects at degree level without having studied them at A Level and Law is a very good example of this. There are almost endless possibilities of new subjects you can take at university without prior experience – but obviously, when you apply you have to be very clear about why you want to take up a new subject and why you know it is the subject for you.

However, for certain degree courses, particular subject choices at A Level are often required or preferred. Such courses include more obvious areas of study such as science based courses, Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science, Physiotherapy, Pharmacy or Engineering. However, courses such as ICT, primary teaching, Art, Music, Drama or Psychology often demand a particular combination of A Level subjects and for subjects such as History, English or Law, then certain A Levels are often preferred.

It is also very important to consider which subjects you think you will achieve high grades in as low grades can be just as much a barrier to university entry as choosing the wrong subjects.

ACCESSING THE RUSSELL GROUP UNIVERSITIES

The Russell Group universities, a group representing 24 of the UK's leading universities, including Cambridge, Oxford and Durham, has developed a new website to help students and parents find out more about how subjects taken in Sixth Form can affect students' options at university and later on. This is an excellent source of information about the different qualifications available at Level 3 and offers advice about which subjects may be important or of particular relevance to a wide range of degree courses. The majority of our Sixth Form students progress from A Level to degree level study.

Students have taken degrees in policing and investigation and events management while others have entered the exciting world of degrees in motorsport engineering.

We are always thrilled to hear from our alumni and can list among our former students doctors, nurses, vets, a dentist, solicitors, accountants, senior finance directors, business managers, an auctioneer, physicists, research scientists, forensic scientists, pharmacists, engineers and people who work in fashion and design, to name but a few. Many of our students have gone on to be teachers and some have returned to teach at this school. Others lecture at university. We know of former students who have successful careers in the performing and expressive arts and of one who is now a High Court Judge based in Cardiff.

However, university is not for all and increasing numbers of our students are entering employment or taking up exciting apprenticeships. Last year our students secured apprenticeships in a wide range of fields including software engineering, accountancy, banking, legal services, health and safety, the leisure industry and dental care.

Whichever route our students decide to pursue, we offer plenty of careers support and guidance to ensure that they progress to positive destinations when they leave The Polesworth School Sixth Form @ Tomlinson Hall.
